#### Light

Dear Grace Church Family,

As we come to the beginning of a new month we come also to the beginning of a new church year as we enter the season of Advent. The theme of Advent is renewal and preparation for the return of God's light, our Savior Jesus Christ. With all of the secular hype and materialism which has been building to a frenzy as the preparations for Christmas continue unabated it is easy to lose sight of the gentle light which surrounds us at this special season. If we don't slow down to experience the wonder of Advent, how can we truly celebrate the joy of Christmas? Advent and Christmas are all about the gift of light. We are reminded of this as we watch the growing lights on the Advent wreath and as we celebrate the festal lights of Christmas. It is far too easy for the harsh light of the secular observance of the Incarnation to overpower God's gentle light in our lives. A light that we are called to share not just with a few And not just on one day or even a short season of twelve days but throughout the coming year and with all whose lives touch ours.

The gift of light for me is deeply rooted in my childhood. When I was growing up in Pennsylvania, we lived in a part of that state where there were many Moravian congregations. Advent and Christmas were always special times in Bucks County among the Moravian community as indeed they are intended to be in all Christian communities. Light, God's light, is a focus of the Moravian observance of these days of preparation and celebration of Incarnation. It is a time filled with the hope of the season as symbolized by light and in the promise of faith. Each year on Christmas Eve, the Moravian congregation in Lititz gathers to celebrate The Christmas Eve Vigils, a service filled with joy, light and the wonder of God's love for humankind. Shining over the congregation and seeming to grow more brilliant with each scripture reading and ever more glorious music is the brilliant Moravian Star which hangs suspended in the Nave. The Moravians are wonderful singers and the church is filled with the joyous harmonies of familial hymns and anthems music brought with their forebears when they fled their homeland to escape religious persecution. One of the pieces that is always a part of the Vigils is a beautiful and haunting piece, "Mache Dich Auf Werde Licht" by the noted Moravian composer Karl Gottlieb Reissiger. Part of that text is my prayer for all of us during these holy days of Advent and into the joyous twelve days of Christmas:

"Throw open your heart, your soul, your mind' free them of all those thoughts and desires which limit God's presence in your life; let them be bathed in the cleansing light of love, kindness and understanding.

Then your light will shine among people; You will be as a light in darkness, and the Glory of God Will be over and around you. AMEN"

With best wishes for a blessed Advent, a joyous Christmas and a New Year filled with the hope and promise of God's continuing presence in your lives as together we work to reveal God's love and to further that part of God's mission that has been entrusted to us.

At the start of our Grace, Gratitude and Generosity stewardship campaign earlier this year I was bound and determined to put my attitude of gratitude into a 12 month perspective by being more intentional in acknowledging the blessings and bounty of my life and the people in it, both personally and professionally. By the way, how's yours going for you? And I'm going to try to jot something down regularly. The one thing I do know is that my entries give me a lot of comfort when I'm feeling a little down and offer an immediate spirit booster. It really

doesn't take a lot of time to write down everything you're thankful for – a warm day, your family and friends, your animal companions, a good outcome on a medical test, a beautiful sunset, whatever it is be thankful and write it down.

One of the best ways to be grateful for all that God has given you is to give back or to pay it forward. It is better to give than receive – the reward is an uplifting feeling and doing something for the greater good. And this time of the year is chock full of ways to give back. If you aren't ready for any a long term volunteer commitment, get your feet wet incrementally by buying a toy to stuff a cruiser, take a request off the angel tree and fulfill it, adopt a family for the season through Newington Social Services, buy some food for the food bank, then look for opportunities throughout the year: volunteer at an animal shelter, deliver meals for Meals on Wheels, volunteer at a community cleanup day.

Often it is easy to lose perspective on exactly what we do have and take for granted every day. An attitude of gratitude helps us stop taking our life for granted and can inspire us to think of other people and to "Love your neighbor as yourself". Be warmed by the goodness around you this holiday season and give thanks to all that you have and for all the blessings and richness of life every day of the year.

Saturday of the month. The time is from 8 am to 10 am.



Convention News for the Episcopal Church in Connecticut.

As some of you may already know, the most recent Convention took place on Friday (10/24) and Saturday (10/25) in Waterbury, CT. Approximately 566 people were scheduled to attend the two day event. Friday evening, there was a special reception and dinner in Bishop Curry's honor to celebrate his retirement from the diocese of Connecticut. It was reported to be a lovely affair.

It's always such a special and uplifting time

together, as we share in the Eucharist, in the prayers and in the joyful noise. You can't deny that God is present and the Spirit is at work amongst us.

The budget was presented and passed; as a matter of fact, Bishop Douglas has not taken an increase in salary. I would like to share a couple of Resolutions: Resolution #8 called for the General Convention to adopt the "Charter for the Safety of People within the Churches of the Anglican Community", and requests that all parishes, dioceses and institutions of the Episcopal church implement the charter. Due to the importance of this resolution, it is most important that we all keep our Safe church certificates up to date. If anyone is interested in signing up for the first time or for renewal, please contact Father David or Melissa Haseley.

Resolution #9 refers to a new task force, "TREC-CT" and charges them to develop recommended revisions to the organization and structure of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut. We broke off into groups by these categories – Catalyst. Connector (connecting with our community more broadly), Capability Builder (where do we need to grow) and Convener. There were many common threads and themes needed to re-imagine the Episcopal Church, such as communication, flexibility, listening, passion, etc. This resolution will help to further God's mission more effectively as we live together as the Body of Christ.

There were a total of 13 Resolutions presented at Convention. If you have any questions or would like more information, please see Bev Manning or me.

We have all been charged and challenged to share our gifts and talents. I believe the following bible verse sums it up nicely – 1Peter 4:10 – "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace."

Beverley Manning and I would like to thank you for choosing us as Grace's delegates to Convention, and for giving us the opportunity to have Grace's voice heard.
