
The season of Advent, beginning on December 1<sup>st</sup>, with its themes of darkness and light, and of Christ coming not once, but twice into the world, may be a good time to assess your end of life plans. The days are getting shorter and shorter as we count down the last few weeks of 2019. With two recent funerals in our memories, the fragility of life and the fleeting nature of human existence may seem ever more real as we deal with less sunlight in which to accomplish our daily goals. Since our mortality is an unavoidable fact, it is wise to have plans in place to make our final transition as smooth as possible.

End of life planning is a fear-provoking idea for some, but for those of you who want to help their loved ones to make necessary decisions in a time of heighten emotion and grief, documentation of your wishes is a loving gift. There are two general categories for end of life decisions. The first is a statement of your medical wishes. At what point in your care do you want medical intervention and when do you want it to stop? The link below will take you to the Office of the State Attorney General, William Tong, and includes guidelines and forms for creating a Living Will, Appointing a Health Care Representative, in the event that you are not able to speak for yourself, and Advance Directives to make your wishes known. <a href="https://portal.ct.gov/AG/Health-Issues/Connecticuts-Living-Will-Laws">https://portal.ct.gov/AG/Health-Issues/Connecticuts-Living-Will-Laws</a>

The other reality that must be addressed as you make your end of life is the disposition of property and assets. Do you have a legal will? If not, again, you may be creating a difficult situation for your survivors. Arguments over money and property among family members are unseemly at best, and sadly, can sometimes create irreconcilable rifts in relationships. Preparing a legally executed will can alleviate this stress for your family. As you prepare the list of your bequests, we ask you to consider including the church among your beneficiaries.

On a happier note, what are you most looking forward to in this holiday season? As families gather, the expectations of creating picture-perfect events can sometimes create stress. If we can focus on cultivating gratitude for our friends, our family and the joy of just being together, I guarantee that the holidays will be less stressful. Who are you grateful for this holiday season? I am grateful for all of you!

### Support the Save our Seas 2.0 Act!

Oceans sustain life on earth, and protecting the oceans is one important way for us to care for creation. As studies have <u>shown</u> and <u>confirmed</u> over the years, oceans are dangerously polluted. In fact, a <u>study</u> by the National Institutes of Health notes that plastic, in particular, represents between 50% and 90% of global marine debris and that each year between 5 and 12 metric tons of plastic enter our oceans. The scale and accumulation of this plastic have devastating consequences for all life on land, in the air, and in the sea. Plastics not only kill marine life directly, but by contaminating sea life, they can pass on dangerous chemicals to people, animals and birds. Directly and indirectly, marine debris threatens communities and cultures that are dependent on sea animals for food and economic prosperity.

# TAKE ACTION

On November 13<sup>th</sup>, the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee considered the <u>Save Our Seas 2.0</u> Act. This legislation would make significant progress towards The Episcopal Church's <u>goal</u> of working and advocating for the restoration of oceans and marine life for the benefit of future generations. In October 2018, President Trump signed into law the first Save Our Seas Act, which took several <u>important steps</u>, including reauthorizing The Marine Debris Program that has removed over 17,000 metric tons of debris, or trash, from U.S. waters since 2006. The law also instructed the State Department to begin conversations with the countries that produce most plastic debris.

The reauthorization of existing programs under the Save Our Seas Act represented a modest but critically important step in public policy. Today, Save Our Seas 2.0 would take a significant second step by expanding existing efforts to clean trash, particularly plastics, from the world's oceans and the North American Great Lakes through grants, prizes and studies. This legislation would therefore encourage and inspire technological innovations to potentially prevent plastics from entering water, expand and better coordinate existing programs and encourage a much more robust international engagement to tackle this global problem.

## TAKE ACTION

In the future, legislation will need to address and implement some of the efforts currently being piloted by individuals,

companies, and states to significantly reduce the amount of plastics we use each day. However, as private, corporate, and state-level programs test and learn from hundreds of ideas to find the right federal policy to address this global issue, we cannot wait to begin cleaning up and repairing the oceans.
