Dear Grace Church Community,

I am so happy as I sit at my rector's desk writing my first of many entries into our newsletter, Pace of Grace. It was the first time I served as our community's supply clergy that I felt at home. Many of you may remember when my parents and wife, Monica, visited one Sunday in 2019. When I speak about our Grace Community, my mother often says "I love that place!" I could not agree with her more.

January 1st of this year was my first official day as your rector. I prayerfully discerned, with the pandemic still at hand in our nation and state of Connecticut, for us to hold our services online. We have had a Eucharistic service and a Morning Prayer service held online. I also made this prayerful discussion with the diocese guidelines at hand. I also plan on reaching out to everyone on the parish contact list by way of a belated holiday card and a phone call over the next few weeks. My office hours are Monday and Thursday afternoons from 2–5 pm. Please know that as pastoral needs arise, you can reach me by leaving a message on the church phone. Debbie, our administrative assistant, and I can both retrieve those messages. My cell phone will be available for pastoral emergencies such as hospitalizations or a death of a loved one. Your loved one does not have to be a part of our community to contact me for emotional grief support. Family is so very important.

I look forward to the work of love and compassion that Jesus has waiting for all of us as a community of faith.

Our book club is open to all. If you are interested in participating in our February discussion, please send an email to Debbie in the church office by February 1. Thanks and happy reading




