Dear Parishioners of Grace Church,

Do you remember being in school sitting at your desk getting ready to write the date on your paper? You then realize that you have written the incorrect year. He then makes it over the mountain chanting a new phase, "I thought I could, I thought I could."

How we as humans, families, communities of faith, co-workers take on the heaviness that life can throw at us makes a huge difference in how we embrace change and hardships. We as a community this past year have really "tried on" new ways of being in community. We worshiped at home online. We came together with masks. We took communion out of medicine cups; is there a sermon somewhere in receiving our communion in medicine cups? We embraced worshiping both in-person and on-line.

It will be amazing to see what God has in store for us. We can walk side by side as a community of Christians. We are held together by 'His' love.



Diaper Drive: During Christmas we celebrate God coming to us in human form as the Babe Jesus, wrapped in swaddling clothes. This Christmas, in keeping our Baptismal Covenant to *care for those who are in need and respecting the dignity of all*, ECCT's deacons invite you to participate in an ECCT-wide diaper drive to benefit The Diaper Bank of Connecticut.



Did You Know?

- The Diaper Bank works to bring basic health needs, **including 75,000 diapers each week**, to low-income individuals in our state who are struggling to make ends meet.
- Most clients who frequent the diaper bank do not have laundry facilities and laundromats do not allow the washing of cloth diapers.
- Prior to the pandemic, 1 in 3 Connecticut families couldn't afford enough diapers for their infants and toddlers, and the need has skyrocketed over the past year.
- Diapers can cost **up to \$100 a month** and for those who have no choice but to buy them at local convenience stores rather than bigbox retailers, the cost can be even higher.
- The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) weren't designed to cover the cost of diapers.
- Without an adequate supply of clean diapers, babies are more likely to suffer from diaper rash, urinary tract infections, and other medical problems.

No one should have to worry about affording these basic needs.

How can you participate?

- Bring a package of diapers (sizes 3-6) to you parish's services on Christmas, Christmas 1, or Epiphany Sunday.* (no later than January 9)
- Make a financial donation to <u>The Diaper Bank of Connecticut and note "ECCT Diaper Drive"</u> in the "In Honor of" line.

Please drop off your donations by the Angel Tree. CJ will take care of transporting them to the drop-off location.
