The church hive



Bees live in a cooperative way described as "eusociality," or good relations. Each bee contributes a specific skill to the colony, synchronizing its efforts for the benefit of all. Likewise, a church's health depends on all members fulfilling their responsibility to the organism as a whole. Descriptions of hive life mirror Paul's words about the body of Christ, with members having different gifts "but the same Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:4).

According to R.S. Beal Jr., who was both a pastor and a zoology professor, a beehive is the perfect "living illustration of how to walk in unity." He wrote, "Those of us who have believed in Jesus belong to one another just as much as we belong to Christ. We cannot live independently of one another anymore than we can live independently of Christ. Like the bees, we must learn to practice the sacrifice, labor, sharing, and submission of love that together we 'may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ'" (Ephesians 4:15, KJV). How are you using your own spiritual gifts to build up your church "hive"?

## BRIEF HISTORY OF GRACE CHURCH, NEWINGTON CT

### 1871-2022

In 1870/1872 the residents of Newington were focused on the fight for Newington, CT, which was created by the Legislature in 1871. A small group of Episcopalians who had been meeting near the Railroad Station decided that they wanted their own Parish--no more traveling to Wethersfield. Jared Starr, one of the leaders of the Parish, led the appeal to The Diocese of Connecticut and in June 1871, the new parish was created. There was no church building. Mr. Starr led the fundraising, and in 1874 the church was built. The church began steady parish life with a series of visiting clergy. Mr. Starr became a Deacon and led a group of 26 families, as the parish celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

The 20<sup>th</sup> century was going to be a century of challenge and change. The World War I was the first struggle for the church to survive. There weren't enough clergy, and Deacon Starr had retired. One couple, the Hirths, who had been married in 1908, were still members in the 1980s. Grace Church was placed under the authority of the new Christ Church Cathedral in 1919. For 29 years, clergy was provided to the Grace Church; clergy, the staff of the cathedral, and the Bishop visited frequently. There were more challenges coming – the Depression and the World War II. The parish was active even in the Depression. On one Sunday there were three services including Confirmation and YPF afterwards, as they worked together for the parish. The post-war years were about to bring more challenges.

At the end of the war, several churches were still under the authority of the Cathedral. The Bishops decided to place Grace Church under authority of the priest at St. Mark's in New Britain. Something even bigger was happening in Newington--a population jump from approximately 700 residents in 1940 to nearly 30,000 in 1970. All churches either grew in membership or were created. In 1952, Grace Parish received the first full time rector, Father Griswold, and there were 125 parishioners and 45 children. In all the years since 1871, Rev. Griswold was the first full time priest the parish could afford. By 1954, membership was up to 215 adults and 112 children. The Church School had to be taught in one of the public schools on the weekends. The Parish realized they needed a bigger church building and in 1956 a church committee met with Bishop Gray and made an agreement that if the Diocese were to purchase the land at the current location, the parish would build the building. The Church was completed in the fall of 1957, and the loan was paid off in 1980.

From 1957 to 2002 the parish thrived with a large membership and church school, a new rectory, and a church tower. With our fine rectors, the Rev. Richardson Libbey, (1971-1987), the Rev. Martha Hedgpeth (1989-1995), our first woman priest, and the Rev. George Choyce (1996-2002), we still had 200-300 members and an active church school, and several valuable assistants. The Rev. Martha Klein-Larsen was our interim rector from 2002-2004. She was the first Lutheran to serve an Episcopal Parish in Connecticut. She later became an Episcopal priest, a first for the entire church.

In 2004 we called Jane White-Hassler who remained until her retirement in 2012. Rev. David Parachini served as interim from 2013-2015, and then as our Missional Priest from 2016-2018. This was a period of stress and conflict in the whole church, but the church did not close as was typical of many denominations.

The ultimate stress was created by the Covid Virus. The Church was closed at times, and many members were, and still are, reluctant to attend. We used Zoom, met outside, but kept the rules of the Bishops with Lay-led Morning Prayer and occasional supply. After over a year as our primary Supply Priest, The Rev. Valerie Miller became our part-time Priest-in-Charge in January 2021. Our staff includes The Rev. CJ Puskarz, our Deacon; Mei Tsen Chen, our Organist and Choir Director; and Debbie Forrest, our Office manager.
