Post Resurrection Moments

Dear Grace Church Family,

As we continue our Easter observance throughout the month of May we hear, in the Gospel readings, about a number of rather unusual accounts of interactions between the risen Christ and those who are part of the Community of the Way. Something is different about the Teacher. Those who encounter him don't realize who it is until he reveals himself to them. What is going on? It is one of the "outward and visible signs" suggesting that change is taking place in the leadership of the community. The authority for making decisions and setting the work of ministry in motion has begun to be transferred to the disciples. This transition will be completed as the event of the Ascension draws closer and as the Holy Spirit prepares to come fully and powerfully upon those charged with carrying the ministry forward now that Jesus will no longer be present with them at least in the human form that they have come to know. These post resurrection moments all point to the imminence of this transition. They remind us that we are the people of the resurrection, an Easter people, who have been given the responsibility for continuing God's mission.

Each time we experience God's presence in our lives as we seek to do the work at hand, we experience resurrection moments. That is what Jesus was talking about when, in the first postresurrection account in John's Gospel, he says to the terrified disciples hiding in the locked room for fear of the Temple authorities and Pilate's legions, "as the Father has sent me, so I send you". This is a challenge to them to rise to the occasion and to embrace the full meaning of the resurrection. To be sure, Jesus had some idea about how they would do having conducted a "dry run" of the process with the seventy he sent out in pairs. They had done pretty well. Perhaps even with the doubts some of them no doubt had they were ready. The readings from Acts and from the Epistles suggest that they were prepared even if some still had doubts and concerns. They were ready to be the Easter people; people prepared to respond to resurrection moments.

Where are we in our resurrection journey? Are we ready to embrace the resurrection moments which lie ahead for us? In the Collect for the Second Sunday of Easter we prayed, "Grant that all who have been reborn into the fellowship of Christ's body may show forth in their lives what they profess by their faith". Whenever we do the work that God calls us to do, we experience our own resurrection moments. My prayer for all of us in this Easter season and beyond is that as faithful witnesses to the good news of the Gospel, and using all of the gifts of the Spirit given to us at Baptism, we may experience many such resurrection moments as we continue our journey.

The Garden Committee, I bet you didn't know we had one of those did you?!, well it's very loosely structured at this point, but the interested parties are looking for some plant donations to punch up the color and the attractiveness of the front bee and butterfly garden.

And did you forget like I did that was the original intent of that garden to begin with? It wasn't until I was going through some old property committee reports and annual reports to look for some information about our green initiatives for the discernment process, that I was reminded we put the front garden in as a bee and butterfly garden as an educational tool to teach children to be good stewards of God's creation.

What a great idea! And it still is a great idea it just needs a little punching up to make it a wow statement. The garden is being edged, tilled and amended to improve the soil conditions for plantings. Hopefully that will be done the weekend of May 3 – 4. There are some nice plantings in there now that provide nectar-rich flowers for winged visitors but we need some larval plants for their caterpillar offspring and some flat landscape rocks for sun basking to make it a real habitat for butterflies and bees. Additionally, it would enhance the front area of the church with lots of color and make it a more attractive and welcoming transition from the parking lot to the entryway of the church.

With the weather not yet having caught up with the calendar, it is still a good time to divide perennials to create new plants or to dig some up to thin out an existing bed. And if you are doing that in your own garden this season, the church would welcome the donation of the following wish list plants: Rudbeckia, black-eyed susan; Echinacea purpurea, coneflower; Achillea, yarrow; lantana; Asclepias tuberosa, butterfly weed; Penstemon 'Midnight' or 'Sour Grapes'; anything from the Aster family, sedums and Joe-Pye Weed. A nice selection of colorful annuals is also on the list so if you'd like to pick up an extra six or eight pack when shopping for your own garden and containers, it would be gratefully accepted.

If you'd like to volunteer to plant after the last hard frost date of May 15, it will be on the task list for the May 17 Time and Work Day.

Capital Campaign and Money Market Update:

At the end of April, the overall Money Market account balance should be \$62,497. Of this amount, the major elements are: \$35,433 as the posted Capital Campaign balance, and \$15,142 as the posted net Rectory balance (\$1,500 Security Deposit + \$13,642 Rectory Reserves). The latest expense from the Capital funds was a total of \$1,277 for the efforts from November through March to get the church boiler working properly after the initial failure last fall of the main control circuit board. Luckily, our service man was able to get the two major components covered under warranty (about \$1,000 worth) when the factory rep initially said it was past the warranty year and we weren't covered.
