Saying this prayer every morning should help us move through these challenging times.



We are going to be talking about racism. How do we create a brave space to talk about and actually try to do something about racism, anti-racism, systemic change, and anti-black. This is still a priority with ECCT and our bishops. We will be working on resolutions around this important matter at our diocese convention this October.

I just want to state again that Black Lives Matter "is not saying that only black lives matter or that all lives don't matter or that white lives don't matter. The issue is that is white lives have always seemed to matter more; all those lives matter equally. Black lives have to matter just as much as everybody else's." Shaka Hislop.

There is a schedule of events on the ECCT website. There will be a big church service on Sunday the 18th at 10 am. This will have been pre-recorded and available to watch on Facebook or Youtube.


