GOD'S MISSION AND EVANGELISM

Grace possesses a generous spirit and reaches out to those less fortunate, and in the best of times, outreach is a defining aspect of Grace Church. We have learned that mission and evangelism has been commanded of us by God through Jesus Christ. It is with this belief, and with God's loving presence in our lives, that we go out into the world sharing God's bounteous blessings and being the "Light of Christ" to all we come in contact.

In the Town of Newington, a member of Grace Church works at the Senior Center to coordinate state and federal programs for low income citizens. During one recent winter our church and rectory converted from oil to gas heat and there was a surplus of oil in our tanks. By God's Grace, our parishioner was able to arrange for the donated oil to be withdrawn and delivered to three town residents at no cost to them. When informed at our "One Minute Ministry" announcements a joyful and spontaneous applause came from the congregation. It was indeed God's blessing that three households were a little warmer that winter.

OUR PARISH LIFE

When you step through the doors of Grace Church on Sunday morning, you are warmly greeted and ushered into the sanctuary. A quick look around the Narthex shows an area busy with preparation for the service and coffee gathering. The Narthex is the hub of our parish life together. We are a small group, with deep roots and we are seeking God's guidance to grow through the power of the Holy Spirit as we live our mission to renew, serve and accept all people.



We currently share the downstairs of our building with another faith organization, St. Thomas Indian Orthodox Church, in a traditional landlord/tenant role (www.stthomaschurchct.org). We are open to possibilities of expanding relationships including shared worship, education, fellowship and facilities partnership.

We are proud to be a church that opens our doors to all persons regardless of race, ethnicity, capabilities or gender orientation.

We are a Believe Out Loud Episcopal Congregation. Grace

Church is registered with Integrity USA (www.integrityusa.org), and listed on their website as a congregation where LGBT are affirmed.



In 2004 Grace Church received a [GreenCircle Award Program](#) for our fledgling efforts to become a green church. From that starting point, our parish has been proud to do its part over the years to be good stewards of the Earth. We have intentionally committed a million acts of green by asking our parishioners to pledge simple changes in their daily lives and we support global green initiatives locally, regionally and nationally.

OUR WORSHIP

Here at Grace we enjoy a rich history of worship with traditional liturgy and powerful sermons delivered by both ordained and lay persons. We value interpretation of the Lectionaries and how the messages relate to our daily lives.



The laity provides Lay Eucharistic Ministers and Visitors, morning and noonday prayer services in nursing homes on Sundays and a clergy educated and trained healing team ministry that is available in the rear section of the sanctuary, during communion time, for all who wish to request prayers.

Our pastoral care ministries team reaches out to parishioners who are unable to attend Sunday services. This is a loving ministry that is very heart-felt, thoughtful and meaningful by delivering flowers and sending hand crafted cards with messages of hope, love and encouragement.



Our music ministries enrich our worship with diverse offerings of gifts and talents from parishioners and visiting musicians. On Easter, we enjoyed music from our own "Ding-a-Ling" hand bell choir and we have been delighted with offerings from our young people.



OUR FAITH FORMATION

We envision a renewed and vital multi-generational Faith Formation program as we move through transition (<http://www.gracechurchnew.org/about-us.html>) and grow as a parish.

Grace has a strong commitment to Christian Education in the Episcopal tradition by providing an inviting "Place of Grace" church school for our children. In the recent past, our children provided the Bible study as a sermon in the form of art work or felt board with characters to the parish. Our adult forums, bible and book studies offer innovative topics and are led by clergy and/or laity.

OUR STEWARDSHIP

Our history of stewardship for worldwide and local mission supports Grace's commitment to the Diocese and tithing of all unrestricted gifts to Episcopal Relief and Development and the Newington Food Bank.



In 2014 we intentionally moved our stewardship program to the penitential season of Lent in an effort to delve deeper into our relationship with God and to focus on making stewardship a way of life by creating "seasons of stewardship" so it becomes a year around practice.

Since making that change earlier this year, we had a successful spring work day that was a fine testament to being good stewards of all that God has given us, including our beautiful church home. The comprehensive task list of chores and maintenance was about 50% completed and included a wide range of folks who normally don't sign up for these kind of events underscoring that stewardship is not just about turning in a pledge card.



Our stewardship committee has evolved from "pledging to the budget" to the philosophy of gratitude for all that God graciously and freely gives to us. We are continuing on our journey from the "place of scarcity to a place of abundance".

WHERE WE ARE GOING

Our hopes and desires for our life together with our new rector come from defining ourselves through focus group discussions and by the power of the Holy Spirit.

What our parish expects of our new rector:

- preach (with passion) sermons that are faithful to the Gospel but also carry a message relevant to everyday life

OUR COMMUNITY - NEWINGTON

The town of Newington has two beginnings: the first springing from its agricultural roots and the second coming from the industrialization of Connecticut. Newington was founded in 1633 by members of a religious sect from a Massachusetts colony. It began as the West Farms section of Wethersfield.



With a population of approximately 30,500 Newington is a typical New England small town located five miles south west of the capital city of Hartford. Newington is home to the 60 acre Eddy Farm located right in the center of town with its bucolic pastures and cattle grazing. Another iconic landmark in Newington is the National Iwo Jima Memorial, built by survivors of the WW II Battle and located on the Newington/New Britain town line. (<http://www.sosiwojima.com/>)

Nestled below Cedar Mountain, past the town green on Main Street, the Town Hall, Mill Pond Park with its resident population of Canada geese and natural waterfall, there is an avenue shaded by maple trees. Set back from Maple Hill Avenue is the abundant physical campus of what we call our spiritual home, Grace Episcopal Church.

OUR PARISH CAMPUS



A memorial marker shaded by a large oak on a grassy area will draw your attention to our church building that is set back from a large parking lot. An "1874" cornerstone from the original church in Newington is located in the Bee and Butterfly Garden, accompanied by a wooden cross that stands at a height of 18 feet. At the building's entrance is our bell tower topped by a white cross which lights up at night.

Upon entering the sanctuary, which is colonial in design with bench pews, is the baptismal font (ca. 1881). The narthex leads to the rest of the church building's features: a chapel, a library, an office suite, and three rooms for classes or meetings and a stairwell that will take you to the lower level, the "community" area of the church. The community room opens onto a transition patio leading to our memorial garden complete with a stone altar.



OUR FINANCIALS

Grace Church is a self-funded parish. Our parishioners support the church through white envelope income. Our building is debt free and the vestry has voted to pass balanced budgets only. The use of building and rectory rent are initiatives of the vestry to offset the decline of pledge income rather than increasing the withdrawals from the reserve funds.
