


It has been a summer with so many things happening around our nation. As we look at the world changing, we are calling upon God's loving vision for the world. Deacon CJ often prays for the end of gun violence during our Prayers of the People.

Last month many fellow diocese members of the Episcopal Church gathered to address gun violence awareness/action and to pray for the end of it. Our deacons met in June when former Bishop Jim Curry introduced Swords to Plowshares: Northeast. Bishop Curry gave the example that this movement is rooted in Mozambique Africa where the Anglican community there encouraged their fellow countrymen/women to turn in guns after war and bloodshed.

I shared about Swords to Plowshares to give us the hope that something is being done to address gun violence. All over our state the police force is working with the churches and Swords to Plowshares to take guns and make them into something that can grow. This movement is rooted in the scripture reading from Isaiah 2:4, "He will settle disputes among great nations. They will hammer their swords into plows and their spears into pruning knives. Nations will never again go to war, never prepare for battle again." We are making change through prayer and action. Even when it seems overwhelming, know that God is at work within our community, state, and country. We are looking forward to the weeks ahead as we welcome fall, Advent, Christmas and more.

Grace Episcopal Church - Newington is again hosting another fall clothing drive this year. As you are aware, the efforts of this program help us with our outreach programs in Newington and beyond.

We started our advertising campaign in early August and will continue through the end of October; we have collected about 65 bags so far. We are collecting all types of clean clothing and soft goods including shoes, sneakers, boots, sandals, handbags, wallets, belts, hats, scarves, gloves, mittens, sweaters, vests, jackets, coats, all bed and bath linens including towels, bath mats, sheets, fabric tablecloths, window coverings and any other soft items. We will not accept any hangars, books or hard items.

All items need to be placed in garbage bags and placed in the blue bins outside our front doors. If you happen to be at the Church and there are bags of clothes outside by the bins or in the bins, please bring them into the Narthex. We will take them back to the Nursery from there. Thank you and remember many hands make light work.

If you know of someone who has multiple bags of items for the collection and they are unable to bring the items to church, please call or have them call Lynn Page at 860-841-2539 and arrangements will be made for pick-up.

We don't have a final date yet but we are collecting clothing until at least the end of October. Once the final date is scheduled, there will be a sorting and organization date and a loading of the truck day scheduled sometime in early to mid November. There will notices in the Sunday bulletin and October Pace of Grace once these dates are finalized. We hope to get an outside service organization looking for community service hours help us load the truck. All help will be welcome however, and we hope you will consider coming to help us out.
